During foundation training what preparation for applying for GP training would you recommend in terms of conferences, audits etc.?

I would always suggest understanding about practicalities of the career and structure of general practice. For instance it is good to know about the financial aspects such as costs of services, commissioning etc. also CCGs and primary care networks. You can gain an understanding by going to events and conferences, so yes, these would be useful.

Audits and quality improvement projects are always useful and you can even submit them for publishing if you look around for suitable places.

I would also suggest communication courses and understanding about ideas concerns and expectations of I.C.E. My YouTube channel is a group source of information about a career in General Practice. I also have a new series launching soon where I talk to GPs about their careers.

What would you recommend to a FY1 doctors wanting to specialise in General Practice?
